In addition, the creative use of hardwoods throughout the design brings warmth into the space, thanks to their application not only as flooring but also in the walls, seating and rooms'. Overall, the awards have attracted a host of projects, all of which have displayed innovative and cutting edge design, and highlighted the increasing use of natural materials and textures, particularly American hardwoods.
