





In this report it is evident that **the dti** supports economic activities that involve industrial and enterprise development, as well as compliance with the Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment (B-BBEE) Act 53 of 2003, as amended by Act 46 of 2013. During 2016/17 a total of 1 549 enterprises were approved across all the Incentive Development and Administration Division (IDAD) incentives, totalling an amount of R12.8 billion and attracting an estimated R39.4 billion in investment. Throughout this reporting period 23 351 projected new jobs were recorded and claims amounted to R4.6 billion were paid to beneficiaries.

Overall, Gauteng took the lead with regard to number of approvals (597), and projected number of new jobs (8 647). Western Cape was in the second position with 556 approvals, and a projected 8 583 new jobs, and KwaZulu-Natal in third place with 211 approvals and an anticipated 4 513 new jobs.

In the year under review, significant progress has been made in implementing IPAP programmes. One of the flagship programmes, the Black Industrialist Scheme (BIS), approved 36 projects run by black industrialists, allowing them to undertake investment projects of R3.1 billion, and is estimated to create 3 979 jobs and retain 3 837 jobs. Through the approval of 13 projects, the Critical Infrastructure Programme (CIP), played a role in revitalising industrial parks, with approximately R3 billion expected to be leveraged in investment and supporting 2 681 new jobs. In addition to these programmes, **the dti** attracted an estimated R14.3 billion in investment from the private sector through the 12I Tax Allowance Incentive.

Through the Business Process Services incentive, a competitive business support services industry has been established in South Africa. Against the backdrop of continued challenges globally, the BPS is vital to the economy, as more than 80% of jobs created and sustained

by beneficiaries of this scheme are younger than 35, and generates export revenue. During 2016/17, 11 new projects were approved with projected export revenue of R7.1 billion and 6 687 anticipated new jobs. Although the number of approvals in the current financial year has decreased from 1 962 to 1 492, the value of the approvals shows a lesser discrepancy. However, it is clear that the main purpose of the IDAD is to grow sustainable, competitive enterprises through accessible incentive measures that support national priorities. The division is becoming exponentially more relevant as the creation of these jobs and investment would not have been possible without government support, which was acknowledged in a recent report by the World Bank entitled South Africa Economic Update released in January 2017.

I trust that the information provided in this report is useful to our partners and relevant stakeholders.

During the 2016/17 financial year, **the dti** has diversified its strategy by supporting development of new products and processes through incentives such as the Technology and Human Resources for Industry Programme (THRIP), which attracted the involvement of 75 students from various universities across the country and a number of SMMEs innovating from their premises. THRIP promotes the collaboration among government, industry and academia to produce highly skilled human resources and technology solutions, with the intention of improving industry competitiveness

Twenty-three projects with an incentive value of R156.2 million were approved across six provinces, with Gauteng and Western Cape accounting for R47.4 million (30.3%) and R49.2 million (31.5%) of total approvals, respectively. Grant approvals largely comprised research projects promoting competitiveness in advanced manufacturing, green energy-saving research and agro-processing.

The technical recession, which South Africa slipped into during the last semester of the year, meant that **the dti** has to accelerate its energies to reclaim the country's position industrially with full participation of the masses.

The bird's-eye view given by this report confirms the commitment of **the dti** to fulfil its manifest of incentivising support for worthy beneficiaries.

The financial year of 2016/17 was once again an exceptionally active year for IDAD. Between April 2016 and March 2017, **the dti** supported 1 549 projects to the value of R12.8 billion, with a projected investment of R39.4 billion. The value of approvals includes investment allowances of R3.9 billion and training allowances of R83.4 million to beneficiaries of the 12i TAI, who are expected to invest R14.3 billion into manufacturing projects that will contribute to a greener economy.

Other incentives anticipating high investments are the Automotive Investment Scheme (AIS), which will inject R12.4 billion into the Automotives industry, the Business Process Services (BPS) projecting export revenue of more than R7 billion and the Critical Infrastructure Programme (CIP), which is expected to invest R3 billion towards new infrastructure. Furthermore, the CIP aims to leverage investment by supporting infrastructure deemed to be critical for economic development with the intention of lowering the cost of doing business. This is achieved through supporting construction or provision of new and/or upgrading infrastructure for renewable energy projects that are not under the Renewable Energy Independent Power Producers Procurement Programme; investment that alleviates water and/or electricity dependency on the national grids; and development costs to distressed municipalities, state-owned aerospace and defence national strategic testing facilities as well as government-owned industrial parks.

**The dti** has put unwavering effort into its incentive programmes over the past financial year. We are determined to exceed these goals in the next financial year.

I trust that all stakeholders of **the dti**, and IDAD specifically, will find this report insightful. Thank you for your continued support of our endeavours.






#### TYPES OF SUPPORT: 2016/17


IDAD offers three kinds of incentives, namely grants, loans and tax allowances. The majority of the incentives are in the form of cost-sharing grants while loans are comprised of the MCEP loan facility administered by the Industrial Development Corporation (IDC). The 12I Tax Allowance Incentive is the only tax allowance scheme offered by the division. The cost-sharing grants increased from R4.4 billion in 2015/16 to R6.3 billion in 2016/17, while the loans provided through the MCEP loan facility also increased from R23.7 million to R871.1 million over the same period.


Infrastructure support to Special economic zones 2016/17: R1.7bn




#### PROMOTING TRANSFORMATION

the dti promotes transformation through compliance with the Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment (BBBEE) Act, 2003 (Act 53 of 2003 as amended by Act 46 of 2013). More than 80% of the projects approved in 2016/17, including 1 079 SMMEs supported through the EMIA and SSAS programmes complied with at least BBBEE level 4.



#### **BLACK INDUSTRIALIST SCHEME**

The Black Industrialist Scheme (BIS), which came into effect in February 2016, aims to promote industrialisation, sustainable economic growth and transformation through the support of black-owned entities in the manufacturing sector. The scheme, which intends to accelerate the quantitative and qualitative participation of black industrialists in the mainstream economy, focuses on manufacturing subsectors such as oil and gas, agro-processing, nuclear energy and blue ocean economy.

#### APPROVALS 2016/17

A total of 36 enterprises across six provinces were approved to the value of R1 billion. Approximately 56.4% of the R1 billion was accessed by projects located in Gauteng. BIS approvals were spread across 13 manufacturing subsectors, with agro-processing and chemicals dominating approvals. Notably, Gauteng is the only province with approvals from metallurgy, electronics, waste recycling and industrial infrastructure, while KwaZulu-Natal had approvals inclusive of subsectors such as clothing and textile, and aerospace.

Baseline jobs are reported by the applicant at the application stage and these are existing jobs that the approved enterprise is required to sustain throughout the incentive period.

Approved projects anticipate to leverage investment of R3.1 billion with Gauteng, KwaZulu-Natal and Eastern Cape contributing 57.1 per cent, 20.1 per cent and 12.4 per cent, respectively. The 36 approved projects projected the creation of 3 979 jobs and the retention of 3 837 baseline jobs. Consistent with the value of approvals, the majority of projected new jobs are for projects in Gauteng (1 755) and KwaZulu-Natal (1 608).



#### **DISBURSEMENTS**

BIS claims are submitted as per approved milestone and payment is made on actual costs incurred with the final claim submitted upon the completion of all approved activities. **the dti** paid R122.5 million to nine projects from three provinces. All claims were for the first milestone payment to cover expenditure on machinery and equipment purchased. While no new jobs were created, supported black industrialists retained 3 458 baseline jobs.



#### SUPPORT PROGRAMME FOR INDUSTRIAL INNOVATION

The Support Programme for Industrial Innovation (SPII), which was initially administered by the Industrial Development Corporation (IDC), intends to promote technology development through the provision of financial assistance for the development of innovative, competitive products and/or processes. This programme was transferred to **the dti** with the first call for applications in February 2015. The programme is subdivided into the Product Process Development (PPD) Scheme and the Matching Scheme. The PPD supports small and micro-enterprises, while the Matching Scheme assists large companies in pre-competitive activity.

#### APPROVALS 2016/17


SPII approvals for 2016/17 amounted to R13.4 million for six projects, with a projected investment of R14.3 million. While the 2015/16 financial year had nine approvals across three provinces, all six approvals during 2016/17 were from the Western Cape, with four projects approved under the PPD Scheme and two under Matching Scheme. The non-uptake of this programme in other provinces is a concern and consequently promoting further investigation to fully understand this trend.



SPII claims are paid on approved milestones with the final claim amounting to at least 20% of the total grant amount. Contributions by **the dti** towards supporting industrial innovation and consequently long-term employment and competitiveness indicated a decrease from R22.8 million during 2015/16 to R20.8 million during 2016/17.

#### TECHNOLOGY AND HUMAN RESOURCE FOR INNOVATION PROGRAMME

The Technology and Human Resource for Innovation Programme (THRIP) promotes the collaboration among government, industry and academia to produce highly skilled human resources and technology solutions, with the intention of improving industry competitiveness. The first call for applications by **the dti** was from December 2015 to February 2016, and the first batch of projects were adjudicated in May 2016.




Twenty-three projects with an incentive value of R156.2 million were approved across six provinces, with Gauteng and Western Cape accounting for R47.4 million (30.3%) and R49.2 million (31.5%) of total approvals, respectively. The Northern Cape is the only province with one project having a grant value of R1.1 million (0.7%), far below the average of R6.8 million per approval. Grant approvals largely comprised research projects promoting competitiveness in advanced manufacturing, green energy-saving research and agro-processing.

THRIP encourages inclusion of students in each supported project with the intention of achieving a highly skilled South African labour force. The 23 approved projects encompass 75 students in eleven higher education institutions (universities) and one research organisation. The majority of students will be supported across universities in Gauteng and the Western Cape. Approved projects have estimated that R251 million in investment will be leveraged, with the Western Cape and Gauteng contributing 33.5% and 32.5%, respectively.









Aveng Construction (Pty) Ltd, based in the Gauteng province, was approved for R13.4 million to incubate forty SMMEs.

The company partnered with the dti to provide training and development to incubatees for construction activities inclusive of business registering, tendering for bids, project management, financial management and business sustainability. Upon completion of the incubation phase, it is projected that 160 new jobs will be created and approximately R26.8 million worth of investment will be generated.




#### 12I TAX ALLOWANCE INCENTIVE (12I)

**the dti** launched the 12I Tax Allowance Incentive (12I) in July 2010 to broaden the skills profile of the manufacturing sector, improve productivity and accelerate economic growth. The programme supports new industrial projects that use new and unused manufacturing assets, as well as expansions or upgrades of existing industrial projects.

#### **APPROVALS 2016/17**

12I budget of R20 billion was fully committed by September 2016 before the scheduled close of the programme in December 2017. However, 12I continues to approve projects as savings become available. Projected investment increased from R13.5 billion to R14.3 billion.



12I approvals during 2016/17 were spread across six provinces, with KwaZulu-Natal and Gauteng collectively accounting for 69% (R2.7 billion) of approved investment allowance and 73% (R61.2 million) of approved training allowance. Three provinces, Limpopo, Gauteng and KwaZulu-Natal, projected investment of more than R2 billion each and contributed to 88% (R12.7 billion) of total projected investment. On average, the seven KwaZulu-Natal-based projects approved in 2016/17 reported R1.8 billion projected investments per project, an increase from the average of R572 million during the previous financial year.





AIS has supported the development of a world-class automotive sector in South Africa.

The Automotive Investment Scheme (AIS) was designed by **the dti**, to grow and develop the automotive sector through investment in new and/or replacement models. The AIS consists of five subcomponents:


- Component Manufacturers (CM)
- Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEM)
- People-Carrier Automotive Investment Scheme (P-AIS)
- Medium and Heavy Commercial Vehicles (MHCV)
- Medium and Heavy Component Manufacturers (MHCM)

By supporting the automotive sector, the dti aims to assist companies/projects that will increase plant

production, strengthen the automotive value chain and sustain employment. The programme initially only provided support to the CMs and OEMs with the incentive being revised in 2012 to include assistance to the people-carrier components and then again in 2014 to support both the medium and heavy component manufacturers.

#### **APPROVALS 2016/17**

In line with the increase in applications received from 2015/16 to 2016/17, approvals more than doubled over this two-year period.



#### AIS PROJECTED INVESTMENTS ARE ON AN UPWARD TRAJECTORY



Approvals emanated from various provinces, with KwaZulu-Natal benefitting from 33 projects, a substantial increase compared to eight approved projects in 2015/16. Other provinces with significant approvals during 2016/17 included Gauteng and the Eastern Cape. KwaZulu-Natal and Gauteng collectively accessed 89% of the R3.6 billion and are responsible for R11.3 billion of total projected investment of R12.4 billion and 23 750 of the 34 788 baseline jobs to be sustained. Assisted enterprises in both the provinces are expected to create 1 946 new jobs.




#### **COMPONENT MANUFACTURERS (CMs)**

#### ORIGINAL EQUIPMENT MANUFACTURERS (OEMs)






# MANUFACTURING INVESTMENT PROGRAMME

The Manufacturing Investment Programme (MIP) was launched in May 2008 to stimulate investment and economic growth in the manufacturing sector. The programme aimed to achieve this objective through the support of small enterprises and medium-to-large-sized investments that would not have been made without the

grant. MIP closed for new applicants in September 2013 and is expected to continue with the payment of claims up to September 2018.

#### APPROVALS 2016/17

In 2016/17, R400.8 million was paid to support 26 030 jobs, decreasing from R597 million paid to support 31 357 jobs during the previous reporting period.




A total of 4 523 claims, to the total value of R2.8 billion, were paid to MIP beneficiaries since 2012/13 to support 176 692 jobs.

Between April 2016 and March 2017 claims were paid across all nine provinces, with 72% (R287.7 million) paid out to projects in Gauteng, Western Cape and KwaZulu-Natal. In line with the amount of claims disbursed, supported projects in these three provinces were responsible for the creation of 79% of the 26 030 jobs as reported by assisted projects. Despite the lower value of claims paid out to projects in the Northern Cape and Limpopo during 2016/17 compared to 2015/16, supported projects reported an increase in new jobs from 362 to 922 and 806 to 1 958, respectively.





#### AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT ENHANCEMENT PROGRAMME


To stimulate investment in the aquaculture sector, the Aquaculture Development Enhancement Programme (ADEP) was introduced in March 2013 as a sector-specific scheme targeted at primary, secondary and ancillary aquaculture activities. The programme intends to increase production, sustain and create jobs, encourage geographical spread and broaden participation.

The 2016/17 financial year saw the approval of R45 million for eight projects, a slight decline from the 11 approvals for R49 million reported during 2015/16. Projected jobs and investment were also lower in 2016/17 compared to 2015/16.





#### INCUBATION SUPPORT PROGRAMME

The Incubation Support Programme (ISP) intends to promote private sector partnerships with Government to support incubators with the objective of developing SMMEs and nurturing them into sustainable enterprises. During November 2016, ISP was suspended and a new improved programme, the Strategic Partnership Programme (SPP), was subsequently introduced. SPP's main focus is to strengthen Supplier Development and inclusion of new suppliers into the value chain.




The giant steel manufacturing company, Arcelor Mittal, based in Gauteng, intends to incubate individual entrepreneurs and provide steel manufacturing training. **the dti** partnered with the steel company in executing the incubation activities by granting R14.4 million to which an investment of R28.7 will be leveraged and 77 new jobs will be created with eleven incubatees to be developed.

### **APPROVALS 2016/17**

For the period under review, two projects to the value of R27.7 million were approved in Gauteng for the manufacturing and construction sector. In comparison with the previous financial period three projects, to the grant value of R74.8 million, were approved in Gauteng (2) and KwaZulu-Natal (1). These three approvals projected R149.7 million worth of investment to be leveraged and 4 936 jobs to be created by 120 incubatees. The 2015/16 projections for jobs and investment are substantially higher than 2016/17 projections, but this is expected considering that the programme was suspended prior to the completion of the 2016/17 financial year.

Since 2012/13 53 projects were approved to the value of R911 million to develop 3 908 SMMEs.



The ISP grant is disbursed quarterly based on submitted cash flow projections upon submission of quarterly reports and a completed claim form. Payments of R34.6 million were disbursed to incubators across six provinces in 2016/17 with Gauteng accessing 38% (R13 million) of the total claims paid. On average, the ISP has disbursed 21.2% (R9.3 million) less than what was paid in the previous financial year.



### **BUSINESS PROCESS SERVICES**

The Business Process Services (BPS) incentive was first introduced in 2011 with the objective of creating employment opportunities for the South African youth. The programme was revised in October 2014 and currently consists of two components: (1) a base incentive, which offers a five-year operational expenditure (OPEX) grant, to create and sustain complex and non-complex jobs<sup>2</sup>; and (2) a graduated bonus incentive for non-complex jobs, which is available to applicants that create and maintain more than 400 offshore jobs over a five-year period.

Eleven BPS projects were approved in 2016/17 for an amount of R52.2 million compared to 12 with a value of R78.4 million in 2015/16. Despite the lower approval value between the two periods, projected export revenue was significantly higher in 2016/17.



The value-chain of service offerings now includes higher valued skills, such as IT Services, Financial and accounting services, and Legal Process Outsourcing, thus creating career opportunities for Youth to service Global Markets.

Projects were based mainly in Gauteng, KwaZulu-Natal and the Western Cape. While the value of approvals in the Western Cape has been substantially lower in 2016/17 in comparison to 2015/16, projected new jobs and export revenue have increased by 28% and 84%, respectively. Two projects in this province projected export revenue of more than R1.6 billion each and contributed significantly to projected new jobs with 1 653 and 1 282 over a five-year period.

Despite the lower value of claims paid in 2016/17 compared to 2015/16, new jobs reported by projects increased from 37 989 to 44 897 during the two periods. Similar to 2015/16, more than 60% of the total jobs created in 2016/17 were occupied by female employees. The share of youth employees improved from 89% in 2015/16 to 91% during 2016/17, indicating that projects continued to exceed the minimum requirement of at least 80% of youth employees for BPS-supported projects.

Across the three provinces, the Western Cape accounted for 60% of the total of new jobs and 64% of export revenue during 2016/17. Actual export revenue generated by beneficiaries in Gauteng has significantly decreased over the two financial years primarily due to one project generating R536.2 million in export revenue during 2015/16, which is far above the average of R41.2 million. The considerable increase in new jobs reported by beneficiaries in the province may be attributed to a single project that created 1 594 jobs in 2016/17.





- Ayanda, a SA production, won Special Jury Prize at the prestigious Los Angeles Film Festival following its successful screening in the World Fiction competition
- Miners Shot Down, a SA production, scored an International Emmy award nomination in the best documentary category.
- Happiness is a Four Letter Word, is the first emerging black film, made by a black female producer, and first South African romantic comedy production to surpass R12 million at the South African Box office after 32 days on the cinema circuit.

### THE FILM AND TELEVISION PRODUCTION AND POST-PRODUCTION INCENTIVE


The Film and Television Production and Post-production (Film and TV) incentive, offered by **the dti**, is divided into three subprogrammes, namely the Foreign Film and Television Production and Post-production (Foreign Film and TV) incentive, the South African Film and Television Production and Co-production (SA Film and TV) incentive and the South African Emerging Black Filmmakers (EBFM) incentive. The shared objective for all three subprogrammes is to create jobs and increase investment through the qualifying South African production expenditure (QSAPE) spent within South Africa.


For the 2016/17 financial year, R816.4 million was approved for 96 projects that projected 6 029 jobs and R3.8 billion in QSAPE.

As in 2015/16, most EBFM approvals during 2016/17 were for the feature films. Emerging black filmmakers were approved from six provinces, with Gauteng and KwaZulu-Natal accessing 74% (R71.9 million) of the total value of EBFM approvals. 


### **DISBURSEMENTS**

While foreign projects are paid once-off on completion of the production, beneficiaries of the SA Film and TV and EBFM programmes can choose between once-off or milestone payments. New jobs created by beneficiaries are only reported with the final claim for all three subprogrammes. The value of claims paid increased slightly from 2015/16 to 2016/17 with foreign productions accessing 80 per cent (R409.4 million) of the total payments during the latter period. Foreign productions were also responsible for 91 per cent (5 356) of the total jobs created by beneficiaries. This was expected considering that only 33 of the 138 claims paid to EBFM and SA Film and TV beneficiaries were for final payments. While the new jobs reported by EBFM and SA Film and TV beneficiaries only total 523, it is envisaged that this number will increase substantially when final claims are submitted to **the dti**.

### NUMBER OF ACTUAL JOBS SUPPORTED





### MANUFACTURING COMPETITIVENESS ENHANCEMENT PROGRAMME

The Manufacturing and Competitiveness Enhancement Programme (MCEP) was implemented in 2012 to promote enterprise competitiveness and job retention. The R5.75 billion budget for the programme was fully committed by October 2015, resulting in its suspension. To date, MCEP continues to pay out claims. Claims are submitted six months from the start of commercial production and a second claim is then submitted upon completion of the project within two years from date of approval.

### DISBURSEMENT

During 2016/17, 377 claims to the value of R989.2 million were paid, with Gauteng and Western Cape provinces receiving 52.6% and 31.5%, respectively. These two provinces were also responsible for 80% of the total jobs reported at the claim stage and 84% of the total investment generated.

The dti has been mandated with the administration of MCEP grants, while the Industrial Development Corporation is responsible for administering MCEP Loans. During 2016/17, the IDC approved 41 loans to the value of R871 million. Out of the total value of approvals R727 million was for working capital while R144 million was CAPEX approvals for black industrialists. MCEP supports the Industrial Policy Action Plan through the assistance of manufacturing sub-sectors such as automotive, chemicals, clothing and textiles and machinery and equipment.



Of the 148 approvals in the agro-processing sector, 89% are for SMMEs operating in the Western Cape. Of the total approvals in Gauteng, 114 (32%) of enterprises are situated in creative industries. Over the past two financial years of 2015/16 and 2016/17, approvals for high-technology-intensive sectors, such as aerospace and chemicals, seemed to emanate from provinces, such as Gauteng, KwaZulu-Natal and the Western and Eastern Cape, while sectors such as agro-processing, creative industries and metals, were relatively popular in the North West, Mpumalanga, Limpopo and the Northern Cape compared to the other sectors.

EMIA-supported enterprises are expected to submit export sales six months after attending international events. A total number of 204 six months' report-back questionnaires were received from April to August 2016. During this period a total of 548 jobs were created and R702.5 million of exports sales were generated by the 548 beneficiaries.


### **EXPORT SALES PER SECTOR FROM APRIL TO AUGUST 2016**


### SECTOR-SPECIFIC ASSISTANCE SCHEME



### CAPITAL PROJECTS FEASIBILITY PROGRAMME


The Capital Projects Feasibility Programme (CPFP) was launched in June 2003 to promote the exports of capital goods and professional services through giving incentives for high-impact projects within and outside of Africa. The incentive is a cost-sharing grant that is capped at R8m.

### **APPROVALS 2016/17**

Five feasibility studies were approved in 2016/17.



The five approvals are for potential projects in Mozambique, Zambia, Botswana and Swaziland. Through CPFP, the dti supports the development objectives of NEPAD as evident from the projects below.



### DISBURSEMENT

Once entities are approved and milestones are completed, entities have 30 days to submit claims. Disbursements from 2012/13 of the incentive amounts to R250 million.

### SPECIAL ECONOMIC ZONES

Special Economic Zones (SEZs), are geographically designated areas of a country set aside for specifically targeted economic activities, supported through special arrangements (that may include laws) and systems that are often different from those that apply in the rest of the country. Special Economic Zones may be sector-specific or multi-product and the following categories of SEZs have been defined as per the SEZ Act No. 16 of 2014:

 "Industrial Development Zone (IDZs)" means a purpose built industrial estate that leverages domestic and foreign fixed direct investment in value-added and export-oriented manufacturing industries and services;

- "Free Port" means a duty free area adjacent to a port of entry where imported goods may be unloaded for value-adding activities within the Special Economic Zone for storage, repackaging or processing, subject to customs import procedures;
- "Free Trade Zone" means a duty free area offering storage and distribution facilities for value-adding activities within the Special Economic Zone for subsequent export;
- "Sector Development Zone" means a zone focused on the development of a specific sector or industry through the facilitation of general or specific industrial infrastructure, incentives, technical and business services primarily for the export market.






# Revitalisation of Industrial Parks

### CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAMME

The Critical Infrastructure Programme (CIP) aims to promote investment by lowering the cost of doing business through supporting infrastructure that could be critical for economic development. This is achieved through supporting construction or provision of new and/or upgrading infrastructure for: (1) renewable energy projects that are not under the Renewable Energy Independent Power Producers Procurement Programme; (2) investment that alleviates water and/or electricity dependency on the national grids; and (3) development costs to distressed municipalities, state-owned aerospace and national defence strategic-testing facilities, as well as government-owned industrial parks.

### **APPROVALS: 2016/17**

During 2016/17, CIP approved a total of 13 projects to the value of R310.9 million across seven sectors and provinces with an average of R23.9 million per project. Of the 13 projects, 6 (46%) were approved for industrial parks that accessed 73.9% (R229.8 million) of the total approvals. An industrial park is essentially a business complex consisting of companies from various sectors.




The Northern Cape was approved for projects in the agro-processing (2016/17) and agricultural (2015/16) sectors. For both financial years, approvals in Gauteng were spread across more sectors inclusive of waste management (2016/17), communications and property development (2015/16), while approvals in sectors such as manufacturing, minerals, agro-processing and Industrial parks were more common for both years across the other provinces. During the latter year, KwaZulu-Natal had one approval from the retail sector to develop a shopping centre in the Hlabisa village. The shopping centre is expected to create 80 construction jobs, 305 direct jobs and improve the economic development in the area.


All CIP applicants are required to report on investment that the project will generate, and the jobs that it will create. However, approvals for industrial projects are not required to report on these projections but actual figures for both jobs and investment are required when claims are paid. Approved projects (with the exception of Industrial parks) estimated the creation of 2 681 jobs and the generation of R3 billion in investment during 2016/17, with the largest contributor to projected investment being the mining sector (47%). The 2 681 projected jobs consist of 1 234 direct jobs and 1 447 construction jobs with Gauteng responsible for 68% of direct jobs and 71% of construction jobs. The 844 direct jobs from Gauteng were dominated by manufacturing projects (59%) while mining projects accounted for 78% of the 1 027 construction jobs.

From 2011/12 to 2016/17 CIP paid R709 million to its beneficiaries of which R164 million (23%) was paid to 16 projects that reported a total of 963 direct jobs and 3 552 construction jobs during the latter period. The Mpumalanga province created the largest number of direct and construction jobs with 64% while enterprises in the minerals sector accounted for 67%.

### **Ga-rankuwa industrial park**

### LOCATION: Gauteng

It is home to approximately 200 investors in the manufacturing and services sectors. It is 88% occupied with 44% of the tenants in manufacturing and 34 % in services (mostly automotive related) industries.


